▶ A journey through the years

The early years (1827-1899)

The roots of the University of Wolverhampton lie in the 19th century growth of Mechanics Institutes, which provided vocational and general education for working men, and The Wolverhampton Free Library. Teaching first began in 1851 at the School of Art.



The post-war years (1945-1968)

The post-war 'boom' in education led to a growing demand for a variety of subject areas. In 1945, a music department opened and by 1966, with student numbers at over 6,000, the College began to provide Bachelor's degrees and the first ever degree ceremony was held. Meanwhile, at Walsall, a new West Midlands College of Education was created in 1963.



The University of Wolverhampton (1992-present)

In 1992, Wolverhampton Polytechnic was granted university status and became the University of Wolverhampton. Each year over 4,000 students graduate from Wolverhampton. We continue to invest in our students, staff, alumni and in the local and international community.




Early 20th century (1900-1944)

By 1903, an educational foundation had firmly been established with over 1,300 students studying courses including coach building, house painting and pattern making. The foundation stone of the Wulfruna Building was laid by HRH Prince George in 1932 and in 1933 the Wolverhampton and Staffordshire Technical College was born.



Wolverhampton Polytechnic (1969-1991)

On 1 September 1969, the College was officially designated a polytechnic comprising five Faculties: Applied Science, Art and Design, Arts, Engineering, and Social Sciences – a further Faculty of Education was established in 1977. A merger with the West Midlands College of Education in 1991 led to the creation of what is now Walsall Campus, and further mergers with colleges led to the construction of an ambitious third campus in Telford.



In 2015, we were proud to unveil our most ambitious investment programme to date – a £250m plan for investment in education, training and supporting economic growth – that is supporting the University to grow to its greatest ever position of strength by 2020, through flagship projects like our new multi-million pound Springfield Campus.

New developments

The University has expanded further in its offering in recent years. These include our Cyber Centre opened as a joint venture with Herefordshire Council, our £120m Springfield Campus providing courses and facilities focusing on architecture and the built environment, and the Marches Centre of Excellence for Health and Social Care on the Telford Campus.

We continue to invest in our students, staff, alumni and in the local and international community.

▶ A year in review 2020-21

It has been another exciting year for the University of Wolverhampton, marked by many notable developments and the achievements of our students, staff and graduates.



New Marches Centre of Excellence for Health and Social Care

The new £5 million health and social care training centre opened at the University of Wolverhampton's Telford Campus in May 2021, ensuring that students have the skills and knowledge to benefit future employers.



School of Architecture and Built Environment opens

Our impressive new building opened its doors at the Springfield Campus in October 2020, as part of a £120 million regeneration of Wolverhampton's former brewery site. The site covers 12 acres and will aim to help herald a new and thrilling era in construction education.



National Brownfield Research Institute – work begins

Work has started on the University of Wolverhampton's National Brownfield Institute, which will be a world-class construction facility that will focus on practical methods of regenerating brownfield sites, through the pioneering work of professionals and research teams.



Vision 2030

The University of Wolverhampton outlined its exciting strategic plan for the next 10 years, which includes offering a personalised approach to learning centred on individual students, research with clear benefits to society, and a network of science and innovation parks.



Students launch fan club and design clothing in Mumbai for Wolves FC

Students studying University of Wolverhampton business programmes in Mumbai, India, have been working on projects set by Wolverhampton Wanderers Football Club to help bring the football club to the South Asian city.

The first project saw the students developing fan clubs, with one officially being launched and featured on Premier League World, while the current project is challenging students to design a fashion range suitable for the Indian market.



Race Equality Charter

The University has been awarded a Race Equality Charter Bronze Award by Advanced HE, achieving national recognition, aiming to improve the representation, progression, and success of Black, Asian, and Minority Ethnic (BAME) staff and students.



Knowledge Exchange Framework

Research England's Knowledge Exchange Framework (KEF) confirmed that the University is in the top 10% nationally for public and community engagement and also in the top 10% for local growth and regeneration.



Sandwell Aquatics Centre

Students at the University of Wolverhampton will benefit from a partnership with Sandwell Council, centred on the Sandwell Aquatics Centre, giving Sports students the chance to study and train within the state-of-the-art aquatics centre.



Judo partnership extended

The British Judo Association and the University's decade-long partnership collaboration will continue until 2032, which will see the introduction of more specialist facilities to support Olympic and Paralympic athletes based in the West Midlands.



City of Wolverhampton

Wolverhampton has a colourful history stretching back to its foundation in 985AD by Lady Wulfruna, a prominent Staffordshire noble woman and a landowner, who was granted the land by King Æthelred II.



▶ **One of the fifty-six signatories of the American Declaration of Independence in 1776** was Button Gwinnett, a merchant who married Wolverhampton girl, Anne Bowne at St Peter's Church in 1757 before moving to America in 1762.



The World Altitude Balloon Record (without oxygen) of almost 11km (36,000ft) was set by James Glaisher and Henry Coxwell in September 1862, who took off from a site at Wolverhampton Science Park.



▶ **Queen Victoria's first public engagement since the death of Prince Albert** (in December 1861) was to Wolverhampton for the official unveiling of the statue of Prince Albert on his favourite horse, on Friday 30th November 1866. Known locally as "The Man on the 'Oss", the statue was created by sculptor Thomas Thornycroft and cost £1,150.



Originally called the People's Park, Wolverhampton's West Park was opened on 6th June 1881. The gates and railings around the park are the original Victorian ones: they survived being melted down for the war effort during WW2, unlike metal railings throughout the country.



The first automated electric traffic lights in England were originally located on an island in Princes Square in November 1927.

Wolverhampton Civic Hall built in 1936-8 by architects Lyons and Israel in a Modernistic Classical style. It was inspired by Tengbom's Stockholm Concert Hall of 1920-26.



Artist and museum curator, George Wallis, was born in Wolverhampton. He was appointed a deputy commissioner for the Great Exhibition of 1851 – a crucial spark in the development of Schools of Art (like ours). The School of Art building was opened in 1970 by Sir Charles Wheeler: the celebrated sculptor studied at Wolverhampton School of Art (part of the University now). He also sculpted the statue of Lady Wulfrun outside St. Peter's Collegiate Church.





Deposits

All international applicants must pay a deposit before we can issue your Confirmation of Acceptance for Studies (CAS). The deposit amount varies depending on which country you are applying from. Please ensure you check your offer letter for more information. If you are unsure about your deposit fee, please contact us by emailing: international@wlv.ac.uk

Visa Costs

Information on visa costs can be found on the UKCISA website ukcisa.org.uk

Immigration Health Surcharge (IHS)

this fee has been introduced by the UK Government and you need to pay the healthcare surcharge if you're applying for a visa or immigration application for more than 6 months. Students will need to pay £470 per year, this charge will be applied when a visa application is made.

Living costs

All students must provide UKVI with evidence they can pay their living costs, maintenance, and tuition fees.

- ◆ You will need to provide evidence of 9 months of living expenses at **£1,023** per month (**£9,207** per year).
- ◆ If your course lasts for less than nine months, you will need **£1,023** per month of the course (eg. for six months, you need **£6,138**). Remember: this is in addition to the outstanding balance of your tuition fees.
- ◆ If you will be bringing dependants with you to the UK, you will also need to meet a financial requirement as part of your visa application. Dependants are required to have **£680** per month (e.g. **£6,120** for a nine month course or **£4,080** for a six month course).

Financial evidence

You must provide a bank statement that covers 28 days. The money must be in your bank account or your parents' personal account; it cannot be in any other relative or friend's account (unless they meet the UKVI definition of an official financial sponsor).

If you are using your parents' bank account, you will also be required to submit additional supporting documents with your application, such as your birth certificate and a letter from your parents confirming their relationship to you and that they give you their consent to use their account for funding your studies and living costs.

The money must be in the account at the time you apply for the visa and must have been constantly in the account for a minimum of 28 days before the date of your visa application. The final closing balance cannot be more than 31 days before the date of your visa application.

Scholarships

The University of Wolverhampton is committed to investing in student talent from all over the world to create the best opportunities for students to reach their potential. We have a wide range of scholarships available to students who can demonstrate academic and personal excellence. Below are just some of the scholarship schemes available:

Global Opportunities Regional Scholarships

The University of Wolverhampton has 20 scholarships of £3,000 per year for students from the following regions: Sub-Saharan Africa, Middle East and North Africa, East Asia and Pakistan, Europe, The Americas.

Alumni Scholarship

All University of Wolverhampton graduates who choose to remain at the University for their postgraduate taught Programmes receive an Alumni Scholarship of £2,000. If you achieve a First Class degree, the Alumni Scholarship is valued at £3,000.

Chevening Scholarship

University of Wolverhampton is proud to be a Chevening partner. Chevening is the UK Government's international awards scheme aimed at developing global leaders. Funded by the Foreign and Commonwealth Office (FCO) and partner organisations.

Commonwealth Scholarship

The University in partnership with Commonwealth Commission are proud to offer the Commonwealth Shared Scholarship, the Scholarship is for MSc candidates from low and middle-income Commonwealth countries to spend 12 months at a UK university as part of their doctoral studies in their home country.

Visa and immigration

Pre-Cas Interview

Some applicants may be required to attend a Pre-Cas Interview before they can apply for their CAS. Please contact us, if you are unsure whether you need to have an interview or visit the E:Vision portal for more information. To book your interview contact our pre-cas team precas@wlv.ac.uk

Visa/entry clearance

Immigration Rules and the requirements for each visa category can change with very little notice so always check the current guidance at the time you are getting ready to apply.

Generally, most international students will need a Student Route visa to study in the UK but please also check the Government's [Visas and Immigration webpages](#) as they have further details about the types of visas available and who they are suitable for.

Most nationals from non-EEA states who wish to come to the UK to study courses longer than six months are required to obtain a visa (also called 'entry clearance') before coming to the UK.

There may also be other requirements you need to meet, such as having a TB health certificate or Academic Technology Approval Scheme (ATAS) certificate. These requirements may depend on your nationality or the course you intend to study.

When and how to apply

The application process will be online or paper-based, according to which country you live in. To check which procedure is relevant for you, please visit: [gov.uk/check-uk-visa](https://www.gov.uk/check-uk-visa)

You can apply for the visa at any time in the three months leading up to your course start date. Do not leave it until shortly before you travel to apply for your visa as it may take longer than expected to process the application. It is your responsibility to allow yourself enough time for your visa to be processed before you make your travel arrangements. Make sure you don't lose any information by saving your application regularly. Once you've finished, print a copy off for your records.

The application form is completed online and then you will need to attend an appointment in order to have your biometric data captured and to submit your documents/ attend an interview.

To apply for your Student Route Visa entry clearance overseas, you will need to find your closest Visa Application Centre and check with them what their procedure for visa applications is.

To apply for your student visa in the UK, you must first make an appointment with our Visa and Immigration Support team for an assessment of your documents. You will then be given assistance with the online application.

Please remember other documents required (originals only) are:

- ◆ Your passport or travel document, valid for at least six months after your date of departure for the UK
- ◆ Two recent passport photographs
- ◆ Your CAS letter
- ◆ financial evidence to show that you have enough money to pay for your tuition fees and living expenses. This is equal to the remaining tuition fees you need to pay for the year, plus £1,023 per month for at least the first nine months of study.

Your VISA responsibilities

If you hold a Student Route visa for study at the University of Wolverhampton, both you and the University have responsibilities to the Home Office during your studies and we must work together to make sure you meet the requirements of your visa.

Please note, it is a requirement of your visa that you attend your lectures and submit coursework. Failure to attend regularly and to submit coursework will result in your visa sponsorship being withdrawn, and your visa will be curtailed.



How to apply: a 10-step guide

1

Apply

There are two easy ways to apply:

- **Direct to the University** – complete and submit an online application form. You need to include your personal statement and scans of your original academic transcripts and certificates. We submit your application to UCAS on your behalf.
 - **Application via UCAS** – if you're applying for an undergraduate degree or a Higher National Diploma (HND), you can apply directly through the UK's Universities and Colleges Admissions Service (UCAS) at: ucas.com
 - **Application via an agent** – our in-country representatives can help you make your application and apply for a visa, and give advice on studying abroad.

Get your offer

Providing that you have submitted all the correct information, you will receive one of the following decisions by email:

- **Unconditional offer** – You meet the entry criteria.
- **Conditional offer** – You still need to complete your current qualifications, or submit outstanding documents. Your place will be reserved until you meet the rest of the entry criteria.
- **Alternative course** – You do not meet the entry criteria for the course you applied for, but you are suitable for another course.
- **Reject** – You do not meet the entry criteria. We will always offer an alternative course where possible.

3

Meet your conditions

- If you are holding an unconditional offer, you have already met all of the conditions and you will be eligible to proceed to apply for your visa at the appropriate time.
- If you have a conditional offer, then you will need to email your outstanding documents to admissions@wlv.ac.uk or upload them through your e:Vision account.
- If your offer is conditional on meeting the English language requirements, then you may want to consider a pre-session English course. Further information can be found on the International Academy website ia@wlv.ac.uk
- Before we issue your CAS, you may be required to have a Pre-Cas interview. The purpose of the Pre-Cas interview is to ascertain that the student's intention to study in a university in the UK is genuine. To book your interview contact our pre-cas team precas@wlv.ac.uk

Accept your offer

If you're applying to us directly or through UCAS, log in to e:Vision or UCAS Track to accept your offer. If you're applying through an in-country representative, they'll do this for you.

5

Book your accommodation

Once you have accepted your offer (conditional or unconditional), you will receive an email inviting you to book accommodation online.

6

Request confirmation of acceptance for studies (CAS)

A CAS is an e-document and confirms that you have been accepted onto a full-time degree course at an educational sponsor in the UK. Once you have an unconditional offer and are within 3 months of the

course start date, you will be able to request your CAS at which point further checks will be undertaken to check eligibility for visa.

7

Arrange your finances and prepare your documents

You will need to arrange for the remainder of your fees (minus the deposit) and living costs to be in your, or your parent or legal guardian's, bank account for 28 consecutive days. You will also need to pay a healthcare surcharge, which is currently £470 per year of your course. You can find out more information and pay this charge online at: gov.uk

Depending on your country of domicile, you may also need to arrange for a TB (tuberculosis) test to be carried out. Depending on the course you have applied for, you may need to apply for an Academic Technology Approval Scheme (ATAS) certificate. For more information, search for 'applying for a student visa' at: wlv.ac.uk

Visa and immigration

Once you've met the financial conditions and provided all relevant documents to the University, you will be issued with a CAS number and can then apply for your Student Route visa.

Depending on when you apply, you may need to use the visa priority service to ensure your application will be processed ahead of your arrival for Welcome Week.

If you have a conditional offer and do not meet visa conditions, a deposit refund can be requested subject to terms and conditions.

Credibility interview

You may be invited to attend a credibility interview with the Home Office.

10

Arrange your travel

Once you receive your visa, you can book your travel to the UK. See you in Wolverhampton!
