Maria Ivanova is an international relations and environmental policy scholar specializing in governance and sustainability. She was born and raised in Bulgaria and arrived in the United States in 1992 to attend Mount Holyoke College. She began studying international environmental policy as an undergraduate and continued in this field as a graduate student at Yale University. She pursued a joint master's degree in International Relations and Environmental Management and then her PhD at Yale.

Maria's work focuses on the performance of international institutions, implementation of international environmental agreements, and sustainability. She has been studying the United Nations Environment Programme and her book, "The Untold Story of the World's

Leading Environmental Institution: UNEP at Fifty", was published by MIT Press in 2021. Her current work examines national performance on global environmental conventions, and she engages with countries in East Africa to inform policy.

From 2014 to 2016, Ivanova served on the Scientific Advisory Board of the UN Secretary-General, Ban Ki-moon. In 2020, she began a four-year term on the Joint Scientific Committee of the World Climate Research Programme. She is also an Andrew Carnegie Fellow and the Chair of the Board of the UN University Institute for the Advanced Study of Sustainability (UNU-IAS).

Ivanova serves on the External Advisory Board of the Environmental Solutions Initiative at MIT, on the Sustainability Advisory Council at Yale University, on the Carnegie Climate Governance Initiative (C2G2) Advisory Group, and on the Board of the Millennium Institute. In 2018, she chaired the jury for the \$5 million New Shape Prize for global governance by the Global Challenges Foundation.

Professor Maria will be joining us On 23 September 2021 at 4 Pm to discuss her journey as a responsible researcher and shed light on some of her latest academic project.



Overview of the research: This ERAS project proposes exploring the effectiveness of knowledge creation, sharing and transfer in Emerging Market (EM) Multi-National Enterprises' (MNEs') post-acquisition processes in the West Midlands (WM). The aim of the project is to develop a conceptual framework on EM firms' post-acquisition strategy regarding knowledge and dynamic capability development process. For the methodology, I chose a 'historical' approach as most appropriate considering the 'explorative' nature of the project and also as a response to call from scholars of both history and organisational study/International Business for "bridging the gap" between the two disciplines.

About the talk: I would like to use this opportunity as a space where I can share some of the issues and challenges that have emerged with this project, particularly focusing on a couple of areas: firstly, disruption in the research in light of Covid and difficulties in data availability; and secondly, confidence issues in learning and applying a new methodology. In the 300 years since Daniel Defoe wrote *Robinson Crusoe*, which books have we valued the most as a society? And are these the same as the ones we truly enjoy?

As a number of critics have demonstrated, certain years in the early 1990s—1992, 1993, 1994—could all be understood as watershed ones for the queering of North American television. Yet how would our television history, as well as our queer theorization of television, shift if we racked focus and paid closer attention to a putatively less promising year for queer TV, 1991? Taking up that central question, this lecture also extends and evolves a critical approach first developed in Salvato's book Television Scales. In this case, the items constellated together are American media objects produced and distributed in 1991 that simultaneously—and co-constitutively—stake queer ground and make reflexive claims about television as a medium in significant transition, shading into upheaval. They include episodic series

(thirtysomething, Roc), a cable special (Medusa: Dare to Be Truthful), and a mainstream film about television (Soapdish). Building on the idea of cross-serial textuality, Salvato demonstrates that we need, in addition to a method or methods for attending to cross-serial textuality, methodology for understanding textuality—especially queer textuality—cross-medially.

Bio

Nick Salvato is Professor of Performing and Media Arts at Cornell University. He is the author of four books: Uncloseting Drama: American Modernism and Queer Performance (Yale UP, 2010), Knots Landing (Wayne State UP, 2015), Obstruction (Duke UP, 2016), and Television Scales (punctum books, 2019). His numerous essays have appeared in such venues as Critical Inquiry, Camera Obscura, and Discourse.

ANNA SWAN BATES NOVA SCOTIA GIANTESS

NEA HAINING SWAN WAS BORN AT MILLERGOR CORDISSTER CO.N.S. ON AUGUST 6.1846. WHEN ANNA WAS THREE YEARS OLD THE FAMILIA MOVED TO CENTRAL NEW ANNAN AT 17 YEARS OF AGE SHE WAS 7 SEED 115 INCHES TALL AND WEIGHED 413 LSS., AND ATTRICTED THE INTEREST OF SHOWMAN PRINCAS T. BARNUM SHE WAS BILLED AS THE TALLEST GIRL IN THE WORLD AT HIS AMERICAN MUSEUM ON BROADWAY, AND SHE LATER TRAVELLED THROUGHOUT AMERICA AND EUROP WHERE SHE WAS RECEIVED BY QUEEN VICTORIA. SHE WARRIED MARTIN VIN BUREN BATES IN 1871 IN LONDON AND DIED IN SEVILLE, ORIGINS 1865.

We condemn Victorian perceptions of 'freakish' bodies as being exploitative. However, when turning to the detail of certain performers' lives, can a more complex picture emerge? This talk examines the life of Anna Swan, exhibited as 'the Canadian Giantess' on both sides of the Atlantic during the nineteenth century. Dr Helen Davies, Senior Lecturer in English Literature from the University of Wolverhampton suggests that re-reading newspaper accounts of her British tours (1869; 1871) offers some surprising challenges to traditional Victorian ideas of

gender, sexuality, ethnicity, and class, as well as more modern understandings of disability.

This paper shares some challenges I have encountered as a researcher and a performance storyteller of medieval material that is often misogynist and racist.

In 2015, I was frustrated that the medieval gender and race studies research I had been immersed in throughout my academic studies of medieval literature rarely filters through to mainstream medievalist media, film and performance. When I'm annoyed about something, I promise somebody important that I will do something about it in a year and a day. So I recklessly promised to give an oral storytelling performance of Chaucer's Man of Law's Tale at a conference in Swansea.

This was the first of five medieval storytelling shows that I would go on to do, and which have ended up playing a bigger part in my career than I could have anticipated. The shows have played in cathedrals, theatres, museums, libraries, conferences and folk festivals here and in the USA.

What I hadn't expected was that my incorporation of feminist and queer research into these shows would be one of their most successful elements. Audience feedback testifies to the importance of this work, particularly for LGBTQ* people, who realise people like us existed, lived, loved and appeared in literature throughout history. Meanwhile, the academic and emotional labour involved in telling between the gaps in our sources has led to exciting new discoveries for me as a researcher, as well as a deeper understanding of how characters are marginalised due to gender or race.

Using my adaptation of Chaucer's Man of Law's Tale as a case study, this reflective paper shares some of the things I have learnt as a teller of medieval material, and asks what work might be done when sharing early materials that have an ingrained racist and gendered bias, and reflect on what this kind of work might offer our research and public engagement practice.

By way of new agonistic, feminist, and queer readings of Singin' in the Rain (1952) and Sorry to Bother You (2018), focused on the films' politics of race, gender, and sexuality, this talk argues that both Singin' and Sorry stage Bartleby-style refusals of vocal commodification. Singin' fabulates an origin story for the commodification of voice, lampooning concerns about its alienation. Where others seek to de-commodify voice by linking it to the maternal, the body, or the authentic self, Sorry contests such teleological techniques to sound out the uncertain voice of uprising. In both films, the heterosexual romance that is a key plot point is, first, soundtracked and then sidetracked by a Black sonic that can be

queered. In Singin' the Black sonic is the dubbed-in sounds of tap, and in Sorry it is the strange equine roar of uprising. Highlighting both films' conformities to and departures from Stanley Cavell's comedies of remarriage, in which the woman of the pair supposedly finds her voice (though maybe that voice finds her and will not let her go), this talk considers the implications of remarriage as a political-cultural figure and highlights an alternative to it: a sonic waywardness in which sound travels, teleology withers, and the vox populi is open to question and contestation. Only in Sorry is refusal collectivized, diegetically, though its vision is one of antagonism not agonism, its collectivity is small and male, and the queerness of its posthuman (bacchic) turn remains to be read.

Bonnie Honig is Nancy Duke Lewis Professor of Modern Culture and Media (MCM) and Political Science at Brown University. In 2017-2018, she was Interim Director of the Pembroke Center and served as the Inaugural Carl Cranor Phi Beta Kappa Scholar. Currently an affiliate of the Digital Democracy Institute at Simon Fraser University and the American Bar Foundation, Chicago, her work in democratic and feminist theory studies the cultural politics of immigration (Democracy and the Foreigner, Princeton, 2001), emergency (Emergency Politics: Paradox, Law, Democracy, Princeton 2009), mourning (Antigone, Interrupted, Cambridge, 2013) and the democratic politics of refusal (A Feminist Theory of Refusal, Harvard, 2021). Her book Public Things: Democracy in Disrepair (Fordham, 2017) came out days after Trump's 2017 inauguration and her first piece of public writing about that presidency, "The President's House is Empty," appeared on that inauguration day in the Boston Review. A collection of her public writing, Shell Shocked: Feminist Criticism After Trump appeared with Fordham in 2021





Prostate cancer is now the most common male cancer in the United Kingdom and is heading to be the most common male cancer in the world. Currently, around 50,000 men each year in the UK are diagnosed with the disease and around 11,000 men die from it each year. There are around 250,000 of us who are currently living with the disease. I say "us" not only because I am a man (and only folk born male have a prostate) but also because I am living with prostate cancer. I was first diagnosed in 2012, treated in 2012-13, and since then I have relapsed twice and had to be treated for secondary tumours. One was in my pelvis and the other in the spine. I live every day with effects of the disease and the effects of the treatments and I live with the constant knowledge that I may well relapse once again. I also live with constant knowledge that this disease may one day kill me. The important bit is that I live.

I have been a volunteer with a couple of prostate cancer charities since 2013 and this brings me into contact with a lot of people who have (or have had) the disease and, as importantly, with people close to folk who have (or have had) the disease. This got me

thinking one day about wellness. Despite everything, I feel generally well. The everything, incidentally, includes chronic fatigue, regular pain, and stress and anxiety every time I wait for the results of blood tests or scans. For me, prostate cancer is part of the wallpaper of my life. So, I tried to define what it meant to me, as a person with prostate cancer, to be well. This got me wondering what being well was like for other folk who have (or have had) prostate cancer and what it was like for those close to them. With this in mind, my favourite co-author, my wife Catherine, and I set out to find out. We created a short survey that was circulated via social media and we conducted interviews.

This lecture is about what we found.



About the Researcher Development Framework (RDF)



The Researcher Development Statement is derived from the Researcher Development Framework (RDF), a major new approach to researcher development, which aims to enhance our capacity to build the UK workforce, develop world-class researchers and build our research base.




The University of Wolverhampton subscribes to the Vitae Research Development Framework. The RDF is structured in four domains encompassing the knowledge, intellectual abilities, techniques and professional standards to do research, as well as the personal qualities, knowledge and skills to work with others and ensure the wider impact of research.
