

The History of the Printed Image Network (HoPIN), aims to connect those interested in the history of printed images, including (but not limited to) artistic prints, book illustration, chapbooks, ballad-sheets, maps, photographs, transfer-prints, etc.

Political spin in a Mantuan altarpiece: the image of St George in Mantegna's Madonna della Vittoria and a Hungarian woodcut print? - Dr Susan May

Andrea Mantegna's Madonna della Vittoria (1496) was painted to commemorate the so-called 'victory' at the Battle of Fornovo, into which Francesco II Gonzaga had led an army against the French King Charles VIII.

It has gone unnoticed that Saint George in the altarpiece bears some resemblance to a woodcut representation of János Hunyadi (c.1407-56)—a much-celebrated military commander—that appears in János Thuróczy's Chronica Hungarorum (1488). This paper considers why Mantegna may have superimposed the likeness of this near-contemporaneous, mid-European historical figure onto the holy figure of St George.

An art and design historian, Dr Susan May takes an interdisciplinary approach, exploring in particular the interface between theology and local, national and international politics. Chronologically, her research centres on the visual culture of the late-fifteenth/early-sixteenth centuries. She has published detailed analyses of paintings, sculpture and architecture in Italian cities.

A valiant endeavour: supporting Victorian women into regular work in printed illustration - Dr. Johanna Holmes

This talk traces the history of successive initiatives by the (Royal) Female School of Art in Queen Square, Bloomsbury, to support students in finding viable, regular work in the commercial "by-ways of art". Hardly acknowledged at the time, and not studied since, this history, over a period of fifty years from 1860 to 1910 demonstrates a consistent mission to enable talented young women to become financially independent, if they so wished. However limited the success rate (and how do we define 'success'?) the story offers insights into the effects of contemporary social, cultural and economic values on the workplace, and on career opportunities for women.

Dr. Johanna Holmes is a historian of women's commercial engagement with the nineteenth-century workplace, focusing on careers which required technical training, personal agency and entrepreneurial ingenuity – all characteristics in direct conflict with the popular ideal of self-effacing feminine virtue. Her doctoral dissertation, "To use our talents and improve them": women's careers in the London art world, 1820-1860, was completed in 2020 and has fuelled further research into women training and working at the intersection of Victorian values and commercial preconceptions.

Ahmet Ustun is a PhD Student in the Center for Language and Cognition (CLCG) at the University of Groningen. He is working as a member of the Computational Linguistics research group under the supervision of Arianna Bisazza, Gosse Bouma and Gertjan van Noord. His research focuses on multilingual natural language processing with a special interest in cross-lingual transfer learning. In this context, he worked on cross-lingual word embeddings, multilingual dependency parsing and multilingual unsupervised NMT. His research aim is to find efficient multilingual adaptation methods for low-resource languages without suffering the curse of multilinguality.

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

Title: The impact of socioemotional wealth on the relationship between entrepreneurial orientation and debt financing of family businesses: Evidence from Nigeria



Abstract: There exists a shortage of studies that establish linkages between entrepreneurial orientation and debt financing in family businesses. Drawing on socioemotional wealth (SEW) literature, this study aims to examine the relationship between entrepreneurial orientation and debt financing of family businesses, and the impact of socioemotional wealth on this relationship.

Bio note: Afusat Jaiyeola is a Doctoral Researcher at the University of Wolverhampton. Her current research focuses on entrepreneurship, entrepreneurial finance, and financing decisions of family businesses in emerging markets.

She has presented her research at the Asia-Pacific Family Business Symposium, organised by the University of Western Australia, and at two Annual Research Conferences at Wolverhampton University. Her paper won the Asia Pacific Family Business Symposium 2021 Naito Best Student Paper Award, which recognises papers that demonstrate scholarly rigour, contribute to the field of family businesses, and best fit the conference theme.

Prior to pursuing her research interests and academic career, Afusat worked in one of the leading international banks in Nigeria.

A Trip to Britain's Highest Leave-voting Town

Josh Blamire joined the ICRD in November 2021. Prior to that, since 2018 he's been working with an interdisciplinary team at the University of Exeter across two ESRC-funded projects exploring Brexit & COVID-19. In this talk Josh will discuss findings from his residential ethnographic fieldwork in Boston (Lincolnshire), which recorded the highest vote for Leave in the country (75.6%). The research will explore themes of identity, belonging, social polarisation and multiculturalism and in so doing will challenge popular political and media discourses which have come to dominate understandings of Brexit. Josh will also be joined by artist in residence, Helen Snell, who will share some of her ongoing collaborative work in producing an online art exhibition exploring Brexit & COVID-19.



Finding Home

Professor Rina Arya will discuss the notion of home, it is evocative and yet fraught. It has increased valence during Covid;

lockdown has alerted us to the safety of the home and the alienated spaces outside of it. For some even finding a home is precarious. Caroline Walker's paintings of women refugees and asylum seekers depict displaced people in their 'homes'. These spaces are often makeshift, impermanent and sometimes dangerous, underscoring the plight of these women but also articulating the need of finding a place to make home. Walker paints these women in their homes and brings to the fore the subtleties of their personal identities. Without minimising the political dimensions of her subjects, she draws attention to the simple yet profoundly important human need to be in a safe environment, in a space we can call home, albeit a transitory one.

Alexandra Kokoli situates Walker's painting in feminist art practices that examine and critique domestic space. Walker's perspective on women at work and migrant women at home builds on feminism's challenge to the separation between the personal and the political as well as private and public space, and draws attention to labour that is not quite invisible but regularly goes unnoticed. Knowingly subverting the voyeuristic regimes of European modernism, Walker's gaze is also productively troubled by intersectionality and remains that of an embodied outsider, respectful of the other's unknowability while acknowledging its own out-of-placeness. Walker's art thus evokes a feminist flaneuse and border-crosser whose perspective we are invited to adopt, thus also sharing her responsibility for the labour of intersectional feminism

Caroline Walker (b 1982, Dunfermline) has a BA in painting from the Glasgow School of Art (2004) and an MA from the Royal College of Art, London (2009). Recent solo exhibitions include KM21, The Hague, Midlands Arts Centre, Birmingham, Ingleby Gallery, Edinburgh, and GRIMM, Amsterdam & New York. Her work has been included in group exhibitions at the Whitechapel Gallery, London, Walker Art Gallery, Liverpool and Sainsbury Centre, Norwich. Walker is represented in public collections including the National Museum of Wales, UK Government Art Collection, Arts Council Collection, Voorlinden Museum and Kunstmuseum in The Hague. She lives and works in London.

Rina Arya is Professor of Visual Culture and Theory at the University of Huddersfield.

Dr. Alexandra Kokoli is an art historian who researches aesthetic mobilisations of discomfort to political ends, focusing on art practices informed by and committed to intersectional feminism. She works as Senior Lecturer in Visual Culture at Middlesex University London, where she currently leads BA Fine Art, and as Research Associate at VIAD, University of Johannesburg.

This contribution bridges over between my previously published research on deprofessionalisation in 'theatre-making' (2013) and a currently developing research methodology for studying processes of theatre and performance-making which use aurality as their point of departure. By focusing on often innovative and emergent dramaturgical practices, and re-centering the maker(s)' agency over processes of critique, this work foregrounds the affordances of improvisation, conversation and collaboration in academic enquiry.

The 'social turn' in performance at the turn of the 21st century has brought into the vocabulary of theatre and performance studies terms such as 'relational' (Bourriaud 1998, Boenisch 2012), 'participation' (Bishop 2006, 2012; White 2011) and 'immersive' (Klich and Scheer 2011, Machon 2013, Alston 2013, 2016). Bishop, Alston and also Ranciere (2009) and Kunst (2015) are all highly critical of the trends these terms refer to which co-opt the audience's agency within the mechanism of the artwork itself. These critics see relational arts as a manifestation of insidious modes of exploitation. I argue that this approach effectively implicates the artist as a collaborationist within the

workings of neoliberal capitalism.

Drawing on the inherently relational notion of voice (Cavarero 2005) and inspired by the positive potential of immersivity contained within Steven Feld's notion of acoustemology (2015), this paper proposes a post-critical, empirical research methodology which re-centres the artist – and the notion of 'the artist's idiom' – through a collaborative approach in the knowledge-seeking endeavour of academic research.





Supreet Uppal is a lecturer in Psychology at Coventry University and conducted her PhD research at the University of Wolverhampton. Prior to that Supreet has worked at Nottingham Trent University as a Research Assistant exploring the impact of Covid-19 on charity sectors using a mixed methodology approach. In this talk Supreet will discuss her findings from her PhD which focuses on Sikhs understanding and perceptions of mental well-being whilst exploring attitudes, coping strategies and barriers in seeking professional help. Her research consisted of using mixed methodology conducting three sub studies:

- Online survey
- Face to face interviews



Within the framework of art-based/practice-led doctoral research in the art and design sector, there has long been debate about the role of the artefact/creative works in the process of inquiry and in the final submission for PhD examination.

If an essential aspect of a practical doctoral submission is to 'expose' and 'explicate' the particular nature of this role and to reveal and share the understanding generated through the process of enquiry, what form might the exposition take, what elements might it include and what is the distinctive epistemological dimension of these creative elements? Dr Maxine Bristow will address some of these issues in the discussion.

Informed by a recently published book chapter entitled The 'Epistemic Object' in the Creative Process of Doctoral Inquiry co-authored with Professor Carole Gray and Professor Julian Malins, the presentation will consider the advantage of 'exposition' over the more conventional notion of 'exhibition'. It will also propose the potentially useful concept of 'epistemic objects to describe both the diversity of elements that could constitute the exposition and the ambivalence of their ontological status as knowledge bearers. The consideration of these terms will be mediated through reflections on and examples from Maxine's own practice-based PhD. Prostate cancer is now the most common male cancer in the United Kingdom and is heading to be the most common male cancer in the world. Currently, around 50,000 men each year in the UK are diagnosed with the disease and around 11,000 men die from it each year. There are around 250,000 of us who are currently living with the disease. I say "us" not only because I am a man (and only folk born male have a prostate) but also because I am living with prostate cancer. I was first diagnosed in 2012, treated in 2012-13, and since then I have relapsed twice and had to be treated for secondary tumours. One was in my pelvis and the other in the spine. I live every day with effects of the disease and the effects of the treatments and I live with the constant knowledge that I may well relapse once again. I also live with constant knowledge that this disease may one day kill me. The important bit is that I live.

I have been a volunteer with a couple of prostate cancer charities since 2013 and this brings me into contact with a lot of people who have (or have had) the disease and, as importantly, with people close to folk who have (or have had) the disease. This got me

thinking one day about wellness. Despite everything, I feel generally well. The everything, incidentally, includes chronic fatigue, regular pain, and stress and anxiety every time I wait for the results of blood tests or scans. For me, prostate cancer is part of the wallpaper of my life. So, I tried to define what it meant to me, as a person with prostate cancer, to be well. This got me wondering what being well was like for other folk who have (or have had) prostate cancer and what it was like for those close to them. With this in mind, my favourite co-author, my wife Catherine, and I set out to find out. We created a short survey that was circulated via social media and we conducted interviews.

This lecture is about what we found.

Schwarzenegger is an endlessly imitated, much-quoted and often ridiculed star, immediately recognizable as much from his physique as from his voice. This talk will take a sonic approach, informed by Nina Sun Eidsheim's work on racialization and voice, to explain the usefulness of Schwarzenegger's stardom for the production of a sense of community constituted through the encounter with the foreigner in Hollywood cinema. This approach, from an 'insider out/outsider in' perspective as a Hungarian migrant academic working in an Anglophone context, something conceptualized with Trinh T Minh-ha, can open up Schwarzenegger's films to new debates about Hollywood as a site of conflict over what it means to be American, and as a producer of a U.S.-American national identity. The talk draws on examples from Conan the Barbarian and Terminator 2: Judgment Day and the works of Sara Ahmed, Rosemarie Garland-Thomson, Timothy Jay Dolmage, Ghassan Hage, Marie Thompson and Pedro Oliveira among others.



Bio: Gábor Gergely is a senior lecturer in film studies at the University of Lincoln. His research is concerned with ideas of community, belonging and difference expressed through film. He has published monographs on émigré actors in Hollywood (2012) and Hungarian popular cinema and anti-Semitism (2017), and co-edited, with Susan Hayward, The Routledge Companion to European Cinema (2022). His next book is Schwarzenegger: Uses of the Foreign Star (forthcoming with Palgrave Macmillan).



The Researcher Development Statement (RDS) sets out the knowledge, behaviours and attributes of effective and highly skilled researchers appropriate for a wide range of careers. The RDS is for policy makers and research organisations which provide personal, professional and career development for researchers in higher education. The Researcher Development Statement is derived from the Researcher Development Framework (RDF), a major new approach to researcher development, which aims to enhance our capacity to build the UK workforce, develop world-class researchers and build our research base.




The University of Wolverhampton subscribes to the Vitae Research Development Framework. The RDF is structured in four domains encompassing the knowledge, intellectual abilities, techniques and professional standards to do research, as well as the personal qualities, knowledge and skills to work with others and ensure the wider impact of research.
