Yarmila Daskalova is Senior Lecturer in English at the University of Sts Cyril and Methodius, Veliko Turnovo, Bulgaria. Her research areas include British, Irish, and American Studies; romanticism and post-romanticism; and comparative literature. Her publications include studies of Emily Dickinson, Edgar Allan Poe, and W. B. Yeats, often alongside Bulgarian novelists and poets, such as Emil Andreev, Svetlozar Igov, Marina Tsvetaeva, and P. K. Yavarov.

Mark O'Shea has been fascinated by snakes from an early age, and kept his first pet snake when he was about eight years old. This is an account of how this Wolverhampton born and bred snake enthusiast turned his hobby into his profession, becoming an internationally respected snake expert, the author of six books, Curator of Reptiles at West Midlands Safari Park, a television presenter with his own series of Animal Planet and Channel 4, and, more recently, Professor of Herpetology at the University of Wolverhampton.

Along the way Mark has carried out fieldwork or made documentary films in almost 50 countries on every continent except Antarctica. But this, more than five-decades long, journey has not all been plain sailing, because along the way there were some serious snakebites, attempted hijackings, near drownings, and other close encounters with man, beast and nature.

Mark is presenting a series public lectures and at all of them Mark plans to have copies of his most recently published title, a detailed study of 600 of the world's 3,700+ living snake species, almost one in six of all known snakes.

How do creative researchers draw on imagery, philosophies, theories and methodologies from other disciplines?

Interdisciplinarity may be defined as connectivity between disciplines in all conceivable forms. The prefix 'inter' meaning between, can be distinguished from multi-disciplinarity, suggesting many or multiple. Interdisciplinary researchers position their work at the intersection of disciplines. These relationships inform research practice.

8th October 2018

Between Interdisciplinarity and the Expanded Field is an informal and supportive forum for creative researchers to explore opportunities and challenges associated with working between disciplines. It's a place to experiment, to test new ideas and theories, and to discover creative new approaches and methodologies for research and practice.

A diverse programme includes films, performance, storytelling, psychological exercises, and experimental art through quantum physics. We will hear about the liminal spaces of the Black Country as sites of abjection and terror. We experience petite perceptions in sound and vision through immersive sculpture. We explore the corpus linguistics of 'fashion crimes'. And we will discuss political ideology and mindfulness through an interactive experiment. Essentially this conference celebrates the undiscovered, unknown and the unexpected, finding answers in the least likely of places.

Since the turn of the century, we have seen mobile technologies evolve from being expensive, fragile, scarce, puny and difficult to being powerful, ubiquitous, pervasive, easy, cheap and robust. In this time and in every part of the world, they have changed the nature of the commodities, assets, transactions and organisation that constitute our economic lives; have challenged the certainties of political issues, affiliations and processes.

There are clearly different interpretations of their impact from merely a technical aspect of the otherwise unchanged realities of the modern world to a symptom of a slide into the fragmented, subjective, suspicious and transient world of post-modernity which this lecture will explore.

John Traxler is Professor of Digital Learning in the Institute of Education at the University of Wolverhampton. He is one of the pioneers of mobile learning, associated with projects since m-

learning in 2001, the first major EU project. He is Founding Director of the International Association for Mobile Learning, responsible for the annual international mLearn research conference running since 2002. He is co-editor of the definitive book, Mobile Learning: A Handbook for Educators and Trainers, and four others, plus papers, articles and chapters on all aspects of learning with mobiles and their wider impact on society. He has supported and advised UNESCO, UNRWA, USAID and ITU, and worked on projects funded by LSC, JISC, British Council, EU, IDRC and DFID in Europe, the Middle East, Sub Saharan Africa, Latin America and South Asia.

Laura Caulfield is Professor and Founding Chair of the Institute for Community Research and Development at the University of Wolverhampton. She has held academic and leadership positions at the Universities of Leicester, Loughborough, Birmingham City, and Bath Spa. Laura has a background as a psychologist and criminologist and she is currently leading research projects for the Ministry of Justice and the Irene Taylor Trust. Her work focuses primarily on rehabilitation in criminal justice and the needs of women in the criminal justice system. Laura has significant leadership experience and is an expert in research design, qualitative and quantitative methods. Her latest book, 'Criminological Skills and Research for Beginners' was published in April 2018. Laura's work has considerable influence on both policy and practice. For example, in

November 2016 she was invited to give evidence at the House of Lords to the All Party Parliamentary Group (APPG) on the arts, health and wellbeing

About the lecture:

Arts-based interventions have a long and complex history of work within the justice system. From fine art, to drama, creative writing and poetry, dance, to music – the art forms are many and varied. The arts have provided an alternative or complimentary component to rehabilitation, and there is significant evidence that participation in the arts has a positive impact: increasing confidence and social skills; promoting engagement with education and treatment programmes; improving attitudes and behaviours; and a positive impact on well-being. While much useful and insightful research has been produced on the role of the arts in criminal justice, the evidence base has been subject to criticism. For example, the focus of much research in this area has been based on self-reported measures, there has been a lack of robust quantitative data, and it is rare to see evaluations that use pre-test and post-test scores. This lecture will explore the history and role of the arts in rehabilitation, discuss current research and criticisms of the existing evidence base, and propose new and robust approaches towards understanding the impact of the arts on rehabilitation in the criminal justice system.



Professor Jonardon Ganeri, Professor of Philosophy (New York University, Abu Dhabi)



This talk will first define and then look at responses to the illusion of immortality in two thinkers widely separated in time and space: the 5th century Sri Lankan Theravāda Buddhist Buddhaghosa, and the 20th century Portuguese poet Fernando Pessoa. As we will see there are some profound and surprising affinities between these two thinkers, and each can be read in a way that helps to illuminate the thought of the other. Putting these two thinkers into conversation with one another will provide the basis to explore

some of the most fundamental questions about human existence: about the metaphysics of life and death, the phenomenology and moral significance of dying, and the epistemology of absence.

Jonardon Ganeri has research interests in self, attention, consciousness, the epistemology of inquiry, the idea of philosophy as a practice and its relationship with literature, early modernity in South Asia, intellectual affinities between India, Greece and China, and Buddhist philosophy of mind. He advocates an expanded role for cross-cultural methodologies in philosophical research, together with enhanced cultural diversity in the philosophical curriculum. He is a Fellow of the British Academy, recipient of the 2015 Infosys Prize in the Humanities, and named one of India's "50 Open Minds", 2016. His numerous publications include: The Lost Age of Reason: Philosophy in Early Modern India 1450-1700 (OUP, 2011); Identity as Reasoned Choice (Continuum, 2012); The Self: Naturalism, Consciousness, and the First-Person Stance (OUP, 2012); The Concealed Art of The Soul (OUP, 2013); and Attention, Not Self (OUP, 2018).

Aston University and the University of Wolverhampton will be hosting a free one day conference at Conference Aston in Birmingham city centre. The event will reflect on the impact of the Enterprise Act 2002 reforms on UK insolvency proceedings and also consider the potential for further reform. The organisers are delighted to be joined by, amongst others, Andrew Tate (former President of R3), Professor Andrew Keay, University of Leeds, Professor David Milman, Lancaster University, Associate Professor David Brown, Adelaide University who will be presenting papers.

Autumn 2018 marks 15 years since the Enterprise Act 2002 introduced significant reforms to the insolvency regime in the UK. Much has changed in this period, including the introduction of out-of-court appointments of administrators leading to the emergence of pre-pack administrations, the growth of bankruptcy tourism, the operation of the prescribed part, changes in how insolvency litigation is funded, an expansion of the directors' disqualification regime and more recently the widespread media attention being given to the use of CVAs in the retail sector. Whilst there have been numerous consultations and some reforms since, the current framework is very much shaped by the Enterprise Act 2002 reforms. The conference will look at various aspects of the Enterprise Act including its passage through Parliament and will also include consideration of possible future reforms most recently articulated by the Government's response to its Insolvency and Corporate Governance Consultation.

Led by the School of Advanced Study, University of London, in partnership with the Arts & Humanities Research Council and the British Academy, Being Human is a national forum for public engagement with humanities research. The festival highlights the ways in which the humanities can inspire and enrich our everyday lives, help us to understand ourselves, our relationships with others, and the

challenges we face in a changing world.

Smell is unique because it has the special capacity to take us right back to our childhood. Snidge Scrumpin' maps the specific smells that belong to the Black Country, from Banks's brewery's hoppy stink to groaty pudding to spicy curry. In Black Country dialect, 'Snidge' means 'nose' and 'Scrumpin' is 'foraging'. Our events build on research into the Proust Phenomenon, which suggests that odours can reactivate emotive memories. We invite locals to take part in an interactive psychological experiment that collects Black Country smells and tastes that trigger different memories. Participants will be exposed to a number of different smells, and be asked to retrieve and describe memories, and then rate these on various dimensions. Snidge Scrumpin' will demonstrate the importance of the smell and taste for our sense of regional history, and shows how place shapes us. The project will draw up the lost odours belonging to this post-industrial region whilst charting a new 21st century palate.


